Hard to believe that we are already at the doorsteps of Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent, when it seems like we just welcomed in the new year 2025.

We have much to celebrate already in this new year 2025. We are now in "phase 3" of the interim ministry process. A call committee was voted on at the annual meeting January 19, they met with Bishop Tim early February for an orientation on how to complete the Ministry Site Profile (MSP), and they have been diligently at work on that task. The call committee will keep you appraised as appropriate vis-a-vis progress as to all aspects of their work during this exciting phase.

I remind you that it takes on average 2 to 4 months for a call committee to complete the MSP, from the day they were elected by the congregation to the posting of the MSP on the ELCA national database. This is a critical aspect of the whole interim process, as the MSP will be the first impression potential candidates will get of Central Lutheran's storied history, ministry, and goals and dreams for the next chapter of ministry, including guiding goals that will inform the shape of nature of the next chapter of ministry.

Candidates will want to be excited about Central's ministry and future, with the hopes that their gifts for ministry and skills will be a potential match to partner with Central to bring these goals We are heirs of a centuries long liturgical tradition to life. Please continue to pray for the call

committee in their work and completion of the MSP, as well as the upcoming interview phase. Please know that God is already busy preparing who will be the next pastor for Central



Lutheran Church as well as continuing to prepare the great and holy people of Central for the next chapter of ministry.

In the meantime, our superpowers are to continue to do all current ministries with excellence, joy, and passion they deserve. Also, please continue to give strong financial support to all Central's ministries and operations. I can guarantee you that one thing candidates for Call will be looking at very closely is Central's financial history and support as part of their own discernment.

Please keep watch for notices and updates of what's coming up for the season of Lent. It includes a traditional Ash Wednesday service, midweek lent vesper services, and during the Sundays and Lent, I will be presenting a series of teaching sermons on the liturgy, why we do what we do as we do during our worship services.

Your 2025 Council met for the first time on Sunday, February 16. We began by welcoming the newly elected members to the council, and went around the table to introduce ourselves to them and each other. Joining the council this year are 2nd Vice President Ingrid Miller, and our first-ever youth member, Josie Martin, neither of whom have served before. We were also happy to welcome back Hank Koegel, David Braun and Carol Norquist, former council members who agreed to accept another 3-year term.

Installations: We agreed that the Call Committee would be installed during the February 23rd worship service, and the Council Members at the March 2nd service. We ask your blessings as these two committees work individually and together to secure the future of our congregation and the work we do.

Committee Reports: Steve Lambert gave the financial report for Treasurer Kathy Dale, who was out of state. He reported with giving down this month and utility costs up, our net income for the month was a negative \$4,126.42. Larry Helgeson reported from the Property Committee on the progress for the signage to be posted around our grounds.

He received a quote of \$2,200 for these to be done professionally, but also presented some alternative ideas for ways for us to do these on our own.



More to come here. Annette Iverson introduced the idea of members possibly "adopting" a sign to help defray this cost. Also in adoption mode, Lisa Bulkow suggested the possibility of members adopting a solar panel to help defray our energy costs. Every idea is important and worth looking into.

Committee Liaisons: We have many committees working to keep things moving. While the actions of some are obvious, others work silently behind the scenes to make things happen right and as needed. As a council, we need to know what is happening in our congregation, and as a congregation, we need to know to whom we can turn if we see a need. Therefore, we have always had liaisons from each committee to the council, to report at each council meeting. Whether it is a "thank you," or a special need or concern, you have someone who will bring your concern to the council for discussion and action. As I have always said, communication is a two-way street. I ask that

committee members and liaisons reach out to each other to communicate anything that affects

your committee and the important work you do. A




